


A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT OF OUR BOARD OF TRUSTEES

When we made the difficult decision to close our Early Learning Center and Middle School last spring, we were worried, but, in the end, we grew stronger together.

OUR RESILIENT MIDDLE SCHOOLERS

Epiphany School's students and teachers have always "never given up," but this year tested the strength of that motto, revealing more grit and determination than some of us knew we had. Back in March, anticipating a "stay-at-home order" we moved quickly, and, within 36 hours, we reconfigured our Chromebooks adding appropriate safeguards so we could send each student home with the resources to transition online using Google Classroom and other platforms. With these measures in place and with the tools students took home, teachers hosted virtual classrooms and met with students one-on-one using video conferencing through to the end of the Summer Intensive in July.

In addition to all the academic work on Google Classroom, using FaceTime and Zoom we hosted exercise classes and social get-togethers, safe spaces for students to be vulnerable and honest and share their thoughts about the impact of the pandemic and the tumultuous fight for social and racial justice in our nation. Additionally, Johnny Wilson '04, Dean of Students & Admissions, and A.B. Deleveaux, Director of the Arts & Lead Teacher, started "Sunday Vibes," a virtual party through Instagram Live where students and families joined to have fun, play trivia games, and show off some of their talents.

The emotional toll of this pandemic on our students and our entire community has been profound. In response, we worked hard to keep our traditions alive. For example, **graduation for the Class of 2020 was a testament to the resilience of our students**, with a socially responsible, in-person graduation ceremony over 2 days with tailored time slots for each graduate and their family. This year's graduation was a "silver lining" moment and a heartwarming capstone to a year of triumph over adversity.

EARLY LEARNING AT EPIPHANY

The latest research from the National Institutes of Health (NIH) confirms what we already know intuitively. "This international health crisis has precipitated unprecedented, sweeping, and dramatic changes in the lives of children and their families...and early childhood teachers." This reality is devastating communities across the globe, and our community is no different. Thanks to the dedication of our Early Learning Center (ELC) teachers, administrators, and our generous friends, however, we provided uninterrupted support to our families. Specifically, ELC moms and dads were sent home with books, art supplies, and other educational materials along with satchels of suggested activities to keep children engaged and learning. Those materials were then refreshed regularly as teachers connected daily via Zoom and FaceTime, reading, singing songs, and playing games to stimulate brain development and maintain social-emotional health.

WRAPPING OUR ARMS AROUND OUR FAMILIES

Many of our families faced severe socio-economic hardship even before the pandemic. Thankfully, our auditors established protocols for emergency grants to help with rent, utilities, and transportation. We also assisted families in applying for unemployment. Many also experienced heightened feelings of anxiety, sadness, fear, and despair, and, in response, we connected them with our onsite therapists who offered their services virtually to anyone in need.

GRADUATE SUPPORT: AN ABIDING COMMITMENT TO EXCELLENCE

Our Graduate Support Team stayed connected to all graduates by offering virtual college tours, online workshops on resume writing, and classes like "Budgeting During a Crisis." The Graduate Support team also regularly hosted "office hours" to help our high school students with their homework and provided fun activities like a virtual cooking club and virtual movie night.

EXPANDED FOOD SERVICES AND GROWING FOOD AT HOME

Food insecurity and the impact of living in a "food desert"—i.e., a community with limited access to healthy food—are problems faced by many Epiphany families, and the global pandemic has made the situation worse. In response, thanks to Lovin' Spoonfuls, Fair Foods, Church of the Redeemer, and the many individuals who donated paper goods, dry goods, and produce, we expanded our existing food service program and added necessities—e.g., toiletries, formula, and diapers—and every week we distributed 2,500 lbs. of fresh produce and non-perishables, with home delivery for those unable to get in to see us in person.

In addition to getting support from our food pantry, we helped many families grow their own food. The urban garden movement is flourishing in Boston, and Epiphany School is a shining example of how gardens can transform and connect communities. Our two gardening rock stars, Ash Inglis and Ella Kotner, kept the Garden & Greenhouse program humming throughout this pandemic. Working with volunteers and faculty members, **they constructed 10 new raised beds** and created a home gardening program helping families build their own raised beds. They also handed out dozens of fresh basil plants and created adorable "My Little Sprout" houses for the toddlers to grow peas in plastic sleeves that can hang in any window. They have also raked, weeded, pruned, spread mulch, and corralled volunteers to keep the grounds and our gardens in great shape.



The 2019-2020 school year was full of surprises, but, despite the challenges, all grades completed the curriculum goals set out in September. We are proud of the hard work our students put in—from their commitment to joining Zoom calls, to participating in virtual social activities like "the social hour" and "Fun Friday," to completing assignments on time and in good form. We are also proud of our teachers who have gone the extra mile to be creative with their lessons and accommodate our students' learning and social-emotional needs.

The community remained resilient and joyful. We have been there for one another.



We are currently serving a total of 32 children and families and are on track to meet our enrollment goal of 60-70 children.

SOCIAL & EMOTIONAL RESULTS

At Epiphany, character and social-emotional development matter as much as academic achievement, and we continue to use the Holistic Student Assessment (HSA) to assess student social-emotional growth. Students take the HSA once at the beginning of the school year and once at the end to evaluate Resiliency, Relationships, and Learning & School Engagement. Within each of these categories, there are several sub-categories. For example, Resiliency includes Action Orientation, Emotional Control, Assertiveness, Trust, Empathy, Reflection, & Optimism. A mean score of 4 indicates no change on the HSA, and Epiphany's most recent student average of 4.69 shows our program model has a statistically significant positive effect on student social-emotional growth. Although many of our students come to us having experienced trauma and other significant socio-emotional challenges, here they are changing their trajectories.

"At Epiphany I learned that friendships are mutual and that you have to give in order to receive. Some friendships haven't always been easy for me. There was one [girl] who went from being my best friend to someone I just went to school with. During quarantine, I started to think about fixing our friendship, and I reached out. She wanted the same, and now we both want to stay close friends."

In the midst of this awful pandemic, our community was horrified by the senseless killing of yet another black person. What happened to George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Ahmaud Arbery, Sandra Bland, Paul Castaway, Melissa Ventura, Eric Garner, Michael Brown, Trayvon Martin, and countless others is wrong. It is wrong that, despite the 14th Amendment's noble guarantee of equal protection under the law, bias persists based solely on the color of one's skin. We support the communities and institutions committed to the belief that every person is sacred. We stand with the individuals working for justice and peace.

SOCIAL JUSTICE IN THE CLASSROOM

Each year our fifth graders are introduced to social justice issues in our small Reading Enrichment groups. The backbone of this curriculum features both authors of color and protagonists of color from diverse perspectives and is typically led by Epiphany Teaching Fellows, recent college graduates participating in our residential teacher training program (often Epiphany graduates themselves). In this class, 5th graders explore modern social justice issues like police brutality in All American Boys by Jason Reynolds. Then, in the 6th grade Religion & Social Justice class students focus on developing healthy social identities, including elements of Planned Parenthood's Get Real curriculum. Students also study matters of identity—e.g., race, ethnicity, gender, and sexual orientation—to foster empathy for others. Then in 7th grade, this work continues as our students study world religions, visiting different religious communities—e.g., Vilna Shul, the Islamic Society of Boston Cultural Center, Braj Mandir Temple, etc. Finally, as a capstone to this curriculum, 8th graders identify social justice issues that are important to them and give presentations to the entire school community. Past topics have included race relations, the school-to-prison pipeline, climate change, and food justice. Each presentation includes recommendations for specific concrete action steps.

The ongoing fight for equal rights in our nation was also highlighted last year in a series of all-school activities. For example, the 2020 Black History Showcase consisted of a Live Black History Museum, where students and families learned about the lives and stories of important Black historical figures. There was also a Ceramic Exhibit, which displayed pieces inspired by and responding to the art of the Black Power Movement (1960-1980). To close out the showcase, all grades competed against each other to see which grade had the most knowledge about important African-American history and figures.

JUSTICE SYSTEM EDUCATION IN THE COMMUNITY

At Epiphany, we value experiential learning and provide many opportunities for our students to understand the real-world applications of what they learn in the classroom.

For example, on October 25, 2019, our 7th Grade students visited Dorchester District Court with their English teacher, Mr. Joazard '04. With the support of Court Magistrate Anthony Owens, they staged a mock trial in the Courthouse. Students had already read *Of Mice and Men* by John Steinbeck and used evidence from the text to support if the character Lenny should be convicted of murder in the first degree or some lesser

charge. Working in teams, they wrote and presented oral arguments in front of an actual judge. Acting out the trial in a real courtroom invited students to reflect on moral ambiguities and served as a civics lesson about the U.S. justice system as well. Students met the judge and clerks who work in the court, explored the courtroom, and, through their presentations, learned how a trial is conducted.




Last year we continued our partnership with Generation Citizen as a way for students to learn that they have the power to make change in their community. The mission of Generation Citizen is to ensure that every student in the United States receives an effective civic education, to participate in our democracy as active citizens. First, students came to a consensus on an issue that was important to them. They researched the root cause of the problem and developed an action plan. Then, they put that plan to action by meeting with relevant community experts and decision-makers to develop possible policy changes. Finally, on December 19, 2019, students presented their recommendations to their political leaders at the State House. This year's project focused on building healthy community and police relationships.

"My peers and I felt good after the presentation at the State House. We worked hard and needed to be heard. We believe that more healthy connections can be made between the community and the police, and we want to help. When we talked to the officers who visited Epiphany, we learned about all the different events they host for the youth in the community, but we were surprised that we hadn't heard of them. As we talked to officers on what we can do to help them, what stood out the most was updating their website to make it more accessible and user friendly for the community."

Students graduate in 8th grade, but we stay with them for life through our Graduate Support Program, providing abiding guidance through high school, college, and into the workforce. We want every graduate to succeed, both personally and professionally—e.g., being helpful to others, healthy, happy, and supporting themselves financially. Our program includes individualized support to all graduates, including high school placement, comprehensive college guidance, access to alternative post-secondary options, assistance finding jobs and internships, and workshops focused on financial literacy, career readiness, and life skills.

My Epiphany family has always been here for me, and I am super grateful for that. CENTER ON FAMILIES

PARENT CAFÉS

Beginning in fall 2019, we started hosting parent cafés every Thursday through our partnerships with Neighborhood Villages and Jewish Family & Children's Services. These cafés are physically and emotionally safe spaces where our Early Learning Center parents talk about the challenges and victories of raising a family and learn more about important subjects related to parenting. Topics included: Making Reading Fun for Little Ones, Self-Care & Resilience, Financial Planning, and Relationships & Social Connections. During these parent cafés, we also brought experts on-site to lead discussions—e.g. a sleep consultant came in to talk to parents about how to help their children sleep through the night and an OB-GYN to discuss health & wellness with our new moms. In addition, Jewish Family & Children's Services provided a therapist for parents on-site weekly, and we were pleased to see the majority of parents access this crucial resource. These supports helped our parents decrease stress, increase resiliency, and focus on being the best parents they can for their children.

SUPPORTING OUR FAMILIES

While our Early Learning Center and Middle School were closed temporarily due to COVID-19, we engaged families in parent education through weekly virtual Parenting Journey classes for two hours every Thursday via Zoom. In addition, we offered a new parent education class virtually called the Power of Parenting through our partners at Families First, Boston Basics, and Codman Square Health Center.







A rich and engaging academic experience is at the center of what we do, and our Teaching Fellows contribute greatly by supporting Lead Teachers in the classroom as part of their 2-3-year commitment to Epiphany. They receive free room and board on our campus along with monthly stipends, healthcare, and often the opportunity to earn a Master's Degree in partnership with Boston College. Through this special teacher-training program, Epiphany addresses the need to train the next generation of great urban educators while helping our students make accelerated academic progress. Fellows work closely with students, leading small reading enrichment book groups, mentoring students, and helping differentiate instruction to meet the needs of each student. Most of our Fellows are from the same backgrounds as our students, and many are Epiphany graduates themselves.

We had the pleasure to speak with former Teaching Fellow, Jonathan Coicou, who shared his experience as a fellow at Epiphany.

"My experience at Epiphany was without question a catalyst that changed the trajectory of my career as well as my whole purpose and mission as a young adult. I arrived in 2010 with an interest in education, but I had no idea where to begin and how to make it happen. Working as a Teaching Fellow at Epiphany set the foundation for me to learn how to be an agent of change. I not only learned how to teach important content to young minds, but I also learned how to make education more of an experience than an event. I learned how to be aware of the social, emotional and mental well-being of my students in addition to their academic progress. I learned that education was more than teaching until the bell rings, but it is lifelong relationships, unconditional love, and learning how to be present for my students, their families, and our community, from making sure they had breakfast, lunch, and dinner, to coaching them in sports, mentoring them, listening to them, and supporting them in their personal growth. I am currently entering into my eleventh year of teaching (two years at Epiphany and nine in the New York City Department of Education) and serve as the Social Studies Department Chair at my school within the South Shore Educational Campus in Brooklyn, NY. Without a doubt, I believe the roots of my ability to connect with and engage my students, colleagues and community comes from my foundational experience working as a Teaching Fellow at Epiphany."



EPIPHANY HAS ACROSS THE COUNTRY



Over the past 20+ years, we have enjoyed tremendous success with our model and have helped create dozens of "Epiphany-inspired" schools both across the country and overseas. This year, for instance, we hosted St. James School, a wonderful "Epiphany-inspired" school in Philadelphia, for three days. Imago Dei is another such inspired school, and here is their story of how they were founded:

THE FOUNDING OF IMAGO DEI, AN "EPIPHANY-INSPIRED" SCHOOL, AS TOLD BY ITS FOUNDERS, THE REV. ANNE SAWYER & THE REV. SUSAN ANDERSON-SMITH

Imago Dei Middle School in Tucson, Arizona was born of and thanks to the Epiphany School, and with the gracious support of the Rev. John Finley, for whom we will always give thanks. **Epiphany was the inspiration!** John gave us the roadmap to make it happen.

The story of Imago Dei begins with the Rev. Susan Anderson-Smith, who learned about Epiphany while attending the Episcopal Divinity School. Having taught at the National Cathedral School for Girls in Washington DC, Epiphany's commitment to provide an Episcopal private school education solely to economically disadvantaged children deeply inspired her.

On a fall day in 2003, Susan and Anne Sawyer, a student at Harvard Divinity School, visited Epiphany and John on campus. As they walked into John's office, on the seat of a chair was a freshly printed tome of a self-study that Epiphany had just completed for accreditation. With a true sense of accomplishment, John reached down to pick up the document when Susan and Anne asked boldly for a copy. Caught off-guard, John gave the only gracious response to give – "Well, of course!" This was the roadmap that gave birth to Imago Dei, allowing us to open in 2006 and serve children in a region of the country desperately in need of an educational model that empowers children and families to live fully into their potential as children of God.

This generous gift was only the first of many that the faculty, staff, and Board of Epiphany would make over the years. Epiphany has journeyed with Imago Dei along the way. It is our prayer that we will do the same, and our children will continue to make us proud.

Blessings to Epiphany, and all who make these special schools possible for the children and families we serve and who transform our lives.



IMAGO DEI TODAY

"Imago Dei" means "image of God," and it refers to a belief that every person is made in the image of the divine and is worthy of love, care and respect. Much like at Epiphany, Imago Dei scholars are boys and girls grades 5-8 from diverse Tucson families, all of whom qualify for the free or reduced school lunch program under federal rules. There is no other qualification for admission. With its whole-child, whole-family approach that never gives up, and, fourteen years in, Imago Dei is seeing impressive results. Low-income children with similar demographics in Pima County achieve a high school graduation rate between 60% and 70%. But more than 90% of Imago Dei alumni old enough to have done so have graduated high school. More than 80% are pursuing college or career training.

"As Imago Dei alumni navigate drastically changed landscapes, the impact of their time at Imago Dei can be seen more distinctly than ever; most profoundly in the ways they are giving back to the people and communities that have helped them get their footing in the world. Our Graduate Support and Family Services teams are staffed in large part by alumni, doing everything from supporting our curbside Family Pantry pickups, to teaching in the classroom. We can certainly point to academic and professional successes (of which there are many!) as signs of impact, but frankly, I am most proud of the ways in which our scholars lead in the community and try to pay that impact forward. Much like at Epiphany, and, exactly as our founders had hoped, the return on investment in these kids and the energy they reinvest in their respective communities will continue to have profound impact long after they matriculate from 8th grade."


